Lesson #4: GOD BRINGS PLAGUES ON EGYPT (Exodus 7:14-11:10)

The Bible says that God told Moses and Aaron to the River Nile and speak to Pharaoh. They said to Pharaoh, "God said, "Let my people go, so that they may worship me in the wilderness." Pharaoh refused. So, Aaron struck the River Nile with his staff. Plague #1: The water changed to blood. Fish died; the Egyptians could not drink the water. Pharaoh's magicians did the same thing by their secret arts. Pharaoh refused to obey God. He went back to the palace.






Plague #2: God said to stretch out Aaron's staff to make frogs come over all the land. Pharaoh's magicians were able to make frogs appear too. There were frogs everywhere! Pharaoh said,



Plague #7: Lightning filled the skies, and large hailstones came pounding down. Those caught outside were killed. But the storm did not hit the Hebrew slaves living in Goshen.

I have sinned. The Lord is right,' Pharaoh told Moses. 'I will let you go.' Moses spread out his hands to God. The thunder and hail stopped.

Pharaoh, however, then changed his mind and stubbornly refused to let God's people go. He thought he could defy God, but God was not finished with him yet.

Plague #8: Moses raised his staff. An east wind blew all night bringing in a swarm of locusts. They covered the ground making it look black and ate everything growing in the fields until nothing green remained on plant or tree. "I have sinned against God," Pharaoh told Moses. "Forgive me once more and pray to God to take this deadly plague away." When Moses prayed, the wind changed direction and blew the locusts into the Red Sea.





'Get out of my sight,' ordered Pharaoh. 'Don't ever appear before me again. If you do, you will die.'


